This appears to have been particularly true of sorghum mills. A sorghum mill could be established for a capital outlay of \$250, and a rather large number of them appear to have been in existence in Nebraska in the late 1860's.

They normally were in opera-tion only a month or 2 in the fall of the year to use up the annual Food Production harvest of cane and sorghum.

In marked contrast to conditions today, when food processing accounts for a large portion of Nebraska's industrial activity, there appears to have been relatively little commercial food pro-
