## Going At It Wrong

President Truman has appointed Federal Judge Thomas F. Murphy, of New York, to direct a governmental cleanup campaign for the administration. Thus, the administration has hired a judge appointed by the administration to clean up the same administration. It just doesn't sound right from here.

Anyone who is aware of the record Judge Murphy has built up in the past cannot deny his immense energy and capabilities. However, he cannot very well have a free hand in this investigation as long as the outcome may directly involve those who authorized the investigation: namely, the administration.

There is no denying that a cleanup campaign in our government is of the utmost importance. We have read of one scandal after another for the past 5 years, all of them involving men in whom the taxpayers of the United States had placed their trust.

But, this investigation should have no strings attached. Very probably, that is the reason J. Edgar Hoover wanted nothing to do with it. The president has stated that he wants this investigation to be non-political. Under the circumstances, that is not possible. If an investigation of the government is to be non-political, it should be conducted by a person with no political connections-a person named, possibly, by a bipartisan committee of congressmen.

Judge Murphy is an able, conscientious prosecutor. But he will be unable to do the type of job we desire under the circumstances. and if the results of an investigation happen to point the finger of illegal activity at one of Harry's old cronies, then the investigation report will end up beside the Hoover commission recommendations ... in the white house wastebasket.
