Scientists are now at the thres-hold of developing an effective vaccine against polio, Chancellor R. G. Gustavson, of the University of Nebraska, state march of dimes chairman, reports.

He said experiments at several research centers, financed by money contributed through the march of dimes, have been reasonably successful in developing immunity in laboratory animals against the disease.

Next year, the chancellor said, the vaccine may be perfected to a state where it can be used upon human beings for the first time. The difficulty of developing a vaccine, Doctor Gustavson said, has been compounded because not one but four viruses commonly cause polio. Viruses are invisible substances which can be seen only through powerful electromicroscopes.

Doctor Gustavson said the search for a vaccine is one phase of a two-pronged research program being sponsored by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. The second phase is ways to treat patients who are the research.
