To Dedicate Two Children's Homes

Something new in children's homes in this part of the country are the two new ranch type cottages which will be dedicated at Fremont, on Sunday, June 22, at 2:30 p. m. by the Lutheran children's home society of Nebraska on the occasion of the society's 60th anniversary.

Rev. W. E. Homann, of Bancroft, president of the northern Nebraska district of the Lutheran church (Missouri synod) will be in charge of the dedication ceremony.

The Lutheran children's home society is a statewide child care and childplacing agency supported by Lutheran churches in Nebraska and surrounding states, and is the only children's home of its kind licensed by the state board of control.

3 Churches Lose Veteran Pastor

STUART—Rev. Orin Graff, of Stuart, has accepted the pastorate of the Forreston Grove Presbyterian church, about 2½ miles from Forreston, Ill., and will begin his work there August 1.

Reverend Graff has been pastor of the Atkinson Presbyterian church, the Cleveland Presbyterian church and the Stuart Federated church, which is now the Community church, for the past 7½ years.

It was through his efforts the Stuart Federated church became a Community church in July, 1950, and he was installed as the pastor September 10, of that year.

The Graff family lived in Atkinson until the spring of 1951, when they moved to Stuart to occupy the former Methodist parsonage which was remodeled for their use.

Reverend Graff was also a leader in developing the Cleveland Bible camp located about 18 miles north of Stuart on Beaver Creek, where children from the surrounding country and towns receive Bible instruction while camping. The camp has been used for the past three

years and will be used as usual from July 3 to 13.

Reverend and Mrs. Graff and their six small children will leave Stuart the latter part of July.
