

SLICED PICKLES

Slice one gallon of cucumbers real thin. Cover with cold water and one cup salt for seven days. On the seventh day, drain and rinse. Cover with boiling water and one tablespoon alum. On the eighth day drain and cover pickles with water and one teaspoon by using two tablespoons of salt ginger and bring to a boil. Boil about five minutes. Drain and let each gallon cold water. Rinse stand for 2 hours or more Boil 1 quart vinegar, five cups sugar, one teaspoon celery seed, one teaspoon mustard seed. After it comes to a boil, add pickles and oring to a boil again and seal.




