In Nebraska the people's independent party, organized out of the Farmers' Alliance at a convention in Lincoln, July 29, 1890, swept across the state to win control of the legislature, elect a August 30. democrat governor, and unseat all house of representatives.

As Doctor Sheldon wrote, there never h asbeen such a political compaign in Nebraska." Crowds turned out in unprecedented numbers to listen to Independent orators and to sing Independent songs, most of which were set to the tune of wellknown gospel hymns. Indeed, the Independent campaign took on much the color of a religious

Wymore on September 23, 1,050 farm wagons were counted in an independent parade, and 1,600 wagons paraded at Hastings the same day. Parades from two to 10 miles long were the order of the day everywhere.

At Cushman park near Lin coln, 20,000 people assembled on Steptember 1. The crowd was so great that orators spoke from different platorms so that all could hear.


