

The Frontier Woman You'll Do Better Job of Ironing If Your Board Is Well-Padded

Ironing isn't much fun but there are some things you can do to make it easier. If you're buying a new ironing board, be sure to get one that is adjustable, one that can be fixed so you can sit down to iron. If you have to stand and iron, get one of these sponge rubber pads to stand on. Makes everything easier, you won't tire nearly so quickly.

You'll do a better job of ironing, if the ironing board is well padded. So be sure you have an adequate ironing pad. Many homemakers like the pads with foil—they say things iron more quickly and heat is deflected back.

When ironing pleated dresses use paper clips for fastening the pleats at the hem. This will hold the pleats in place.

Put dresses, blouses and shirts on hangers as you iron them and hang them so they can finish drying out. Store on hangers and they'll stay looking much nicer.

Keep one of these window spray outfits handy at the iron-

ing board, filled with clear warm water. If a spot on a garment is dried out you can dampen with very fine spray—or use a clean dampened sponge.

Lay embroidered things on a heavy folded turkish towel, embroidered side down and press. This will bring the design out and make it look better.

If you're thinking of buying a new iron, look them over carefully before making your selection and get one that isn't too heavy. Most of the new irons are fixed to iron around button holes.

"Forward on Liberty's Team" is the birthday theme and the emphasis is on "The Scout Family" of programs meeting the interests of boys in three age groups: Cub Scouting for boys 8, 9 and 10; Boy Scouting for those 11, 12 and 13, and Exploring for boys 14 and up. The high point of Scouting in 1953 will be the third national jamboree. More than 50,000 Boy Scouts will camp at a 3,000-acre tent city on the Irvine ranch in the Newport Harbor area of southern California next July 17 to 23.
