If you've just washed the slip covers and wish to tuck a cloth slip cover into the chair folds smoothly, take your longest silver spoon, or a wooden salad or kitchen spoon, and with the top of the handle work material into the crevices of your chair. Go at it gently so you won't punch holes or split the material.

To keep the slip cover from working out of place on chairs or davenport, fold newspapers the long way, and tuck them down into the folds at the back of the cushion. The paper serves to hold the slip cover down into the crevice and keep it there.

You can take chewing gum from garments or chair seats and such by rubbing it with an ice cube. Then pick off the gum bit-by-bit.

Putting some camphor in your silver drawer will help keep the silver from tarnishing.

Never put rubber bands near your silver. There is sulphur in the bands and they will leave marks on the silver that are very hard to get off.

Keep a jar of silver cream near the sink and any time you see any silver tarnished polish it right away. That way cleaning the silver is never a really big task.

If you have a bad spill-over in the oven, that is burned on, when the oven is cold lay a folded cloth over the spot and pour household ammonia on it. Let it be for two hours or overnight and it will be a simple job to clean off.
