## Former Pastor Dies at Yankton

derlaan, pastor of St. Peters Catholic church at Ewing from 1930 to 1942, died at Sacred Heart hospital, Yankton, on Wed-nesday, June 24 after a lingering illness. Funeral services were held Monday, June 29, from the church last served by Reverend Vanderlaan at Fordyce. Burial was made in the parish cemetery at Fordyce. Representing the Ewing parish at the services were Rev. Peter Burke, Anna Bauer, George Burk and Kent Rother-

Reverend Vanderlaan was born 68 years ago in Holland. He was educated for the priesthood in Holland and England and was ordained in London, England, July 26, 1910. India was the scene of his labors from 1910 to 1921 when ill health forced him to return to Holland. After a year of convalescence, his doctors refused to permit him to return to India, so the young priest came

The bishop at Omaha accepted his services and he was made pastor of St. Joseph's church at Amelia. Seven years later he was appointed to Ewing, where he remained for 12 years. In 1942 Revcrend Vanderlaan was transferred to the parish at Fordyce, ill-ness forced his retirement last September. Father Kaup, former pastor of St. John's church, near Clearwater, succeeded him.
