SALAD TOMATOES Scald tomatoes in your usual way and peel. Sterilize glass one or two-quart jars and pack the peeled tomatoes in the jars. Pour over them strained hot tomato juice. Seal. Process only five minutes in hot water bath, cool jars and store. Firm and fine for sal-
