

Looking along the earth embankment of Ft. Randall dam, being built by army engineers across the Missouri river at Pickstown, S.D. Ft. Randall is the nearest to completion of five mainstem developments. Now three-fourths finished, Ft. Randall was started in 1946. At the bottom of the photo, earth-moving equipment places fill in the final section of embankment. Twentyseven out of an ultimate 28-million-cubic yards are already in the dam. The low white-appearing building to the right of the

embankment is the powerhouse. Directly behind are the surge tanks. Two out of eight to be built have been erected. Across the outlet channel is the spillway-a safety valve to protect the dam from becoming overtopped. Upstream and to the left of the embankment is the intake structure-a 180-foot high concrete monolith connected to the embaukment by a service bridge. The intake forms the upstream entrance to 12 huge tunnels through cliffs which carry water through the dam to the powerhouse and outlet works .- The Frontier Engraving.
