If your curtains are unevenly faded or spotted, as often happens, the Tintex Home Economics Bureau suggests use of color remover first. This will prepare the fabric for uniform penetration of the dye. The washer, however, is not recommended by the bureau for taking out old color, since the large amount of water in the machine weakens the action of the color remover. Instead, use a regular vessel large enough

to completely submerge the curtain in the solution.

The automatic washer is ideal for the dyeing operation, on the other hand. Pour the dye in a quart container of hot water and stir until dissolved. After washing the curtains thoroughly, fill the machine with very hot water and pour the dye solution into it. Let the machine do the rest, right through the rinsing and drying phases. Thus, new-looking curtains, after ironing, are yours for the trifling cost of the dyes.


