Mr. and Mrs. Bennett Gilligan and family left Tuesday, July 27, for Scottsbluff and Colorado. They are to be gone about 10 days.

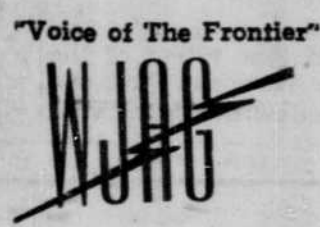
