There is some confusion regarding the 15 acres permitted in regard to marketing quotas. The law states that there can be 15 acres of wheat on any farm regardless of the allotment and that no excess wheat will be involved.

This 15 acres permitted applies only to the marketing quota provision. Since the 1955 farm program will have cross-appliance provision, anyone who overplants any allotment will become ineligible for all price supports. The 15 acre provision is not an allotment and, therefore, anyone, for instance, with a zero allotment or an allotment less than 15 acres who takes advantage of the 15 acres permitted, will become ineligible for price support on all crops produced on the farm.
