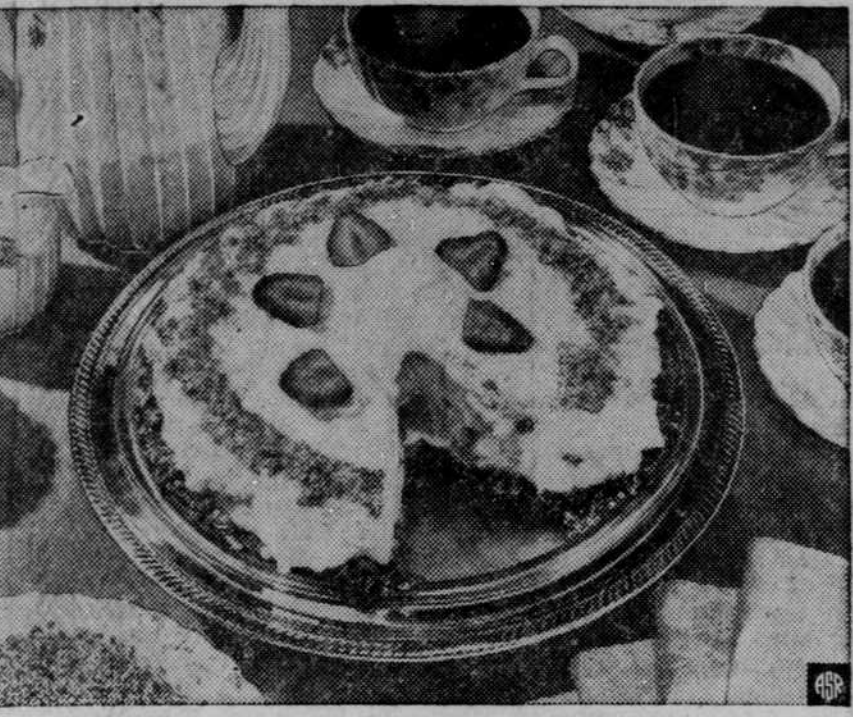
During the past several years we have had numerous complaints of damage being done to school houses and school property at this time of the year and during the Halloween season.

Summertime Treat: "Lucky Chiffon Pie"



Clover Leaves for good luck—and good flavor!—are the "secret ingredient" in a new and deliciously different summertime dessert called "Lucky Chiffon Pie." These flavor-filled Clover Leaves, not the kind that grow outdoors but thin square wafers with a creamy filling, are rolled into crumbs to make the new pie crust. Strawberries, orange sections and pineapple tidbits are combined in the chiffon filling to complete the luckiest dessert choice you can make for summertime entertaining. Here's how:

| 1 1/2 cups finely crushed Sunshine Clover Leaves | 1/4 cup orange juice |
| 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon | 3/4 teaspoon salt |
| 1/2 cup melted butter or margarine | 1 cup pineapple tidbits, drained |
| 1 1/2 teaspoons plain gelatin | 1 cup fresh strawberries, cleaned and sliced (or 1 pkg. frozen strawberries, well drained) |
| 1/2 cup cold water | 1 orange, sectioned |
| 4 eggs, separated | 1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped |
| 1/2 cup sugar | |
| 1 tablespoon grated orange rind | |
- Make crust for pie by crushing the Clover Leaves between two layers of waxed paper with rolling pin. Combine crumbs, cinnamon and melted butter; toss with fork until well blended. Pack into lightly greased 9-inch pie pan. Chill. Meanwhile, add gelatin to water and set aside. Put yolks in top of double boiler; stir in 1/2 cup sugar, grated orange rind and orange juice. Cook, stirring over boiling water for 5 minutes, or until thickened. Stir in gelatin until melted. Remove from heat. Beat egg whites and salt until peaks are formed when beater is raised. Slowly add rest of sugar while continuing to beat until stiff. Gently fold egg whites into hot mixture; let cool until mixture begins to mound slightly. Then fold in well-drained fruits and pour into chilled crumb crust. Chill until firm (about 2 hours). To serve, spread top with whipped cream and garnish with halved strawberries and 2 tablespoons of crushed wafers, sprinkled around the edge. Makes 6 generous servings.

than 40 years.

Mrs. Hull was born at Boone, Ia., in 1855. At the age of 20 she married the late William Hull on October 7, 1876. The couple came to Holt county with two children in a horse-drawn covered wagon, arriving on March 14, 1879, after a seven-day journey from Iowa.

She continues to reside with her son, William, on the family homestead, continues to do the housework, sleeps in an upstairs bedroom and climbs the stairs a half-dozen times a day. She never naps lying down but spends considerable time in her dependable old rocking chair in which she finds it convenient to sleep intermittently throughout the day.

Mr. Hull died in 1929.

Mrs. Hull frankly confides to her family she believes she is "beginning to wear-out" and she speaks of her 100th birthday anniversary in 1955 with a qualified "maybe."

After Monday's dinner she opened her gifts and granddaughters read to her the numerous cards and letters.
