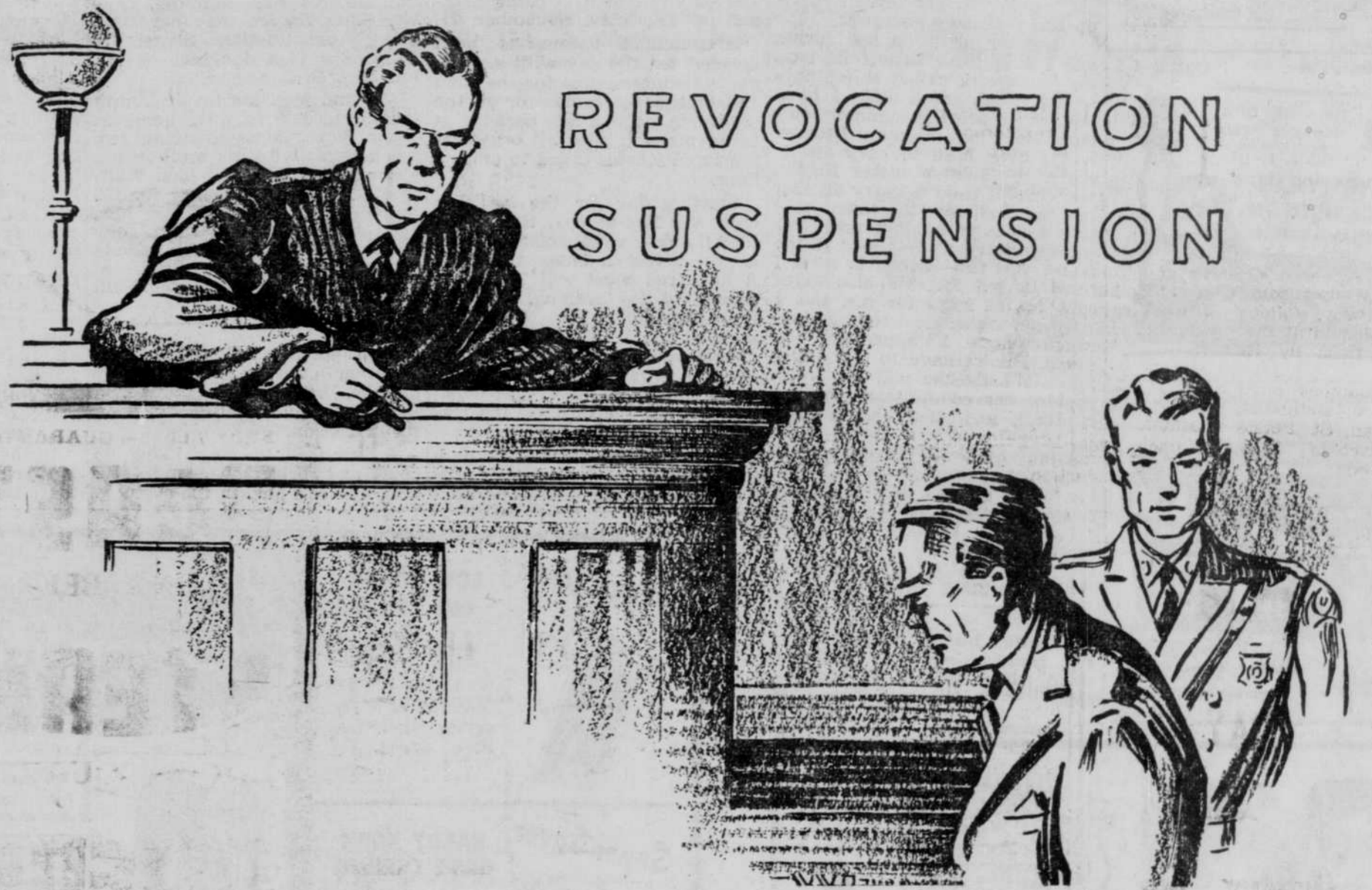

You Can Be RULED OFF THE ROAD**

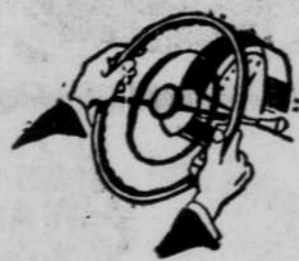
