A. Neil Dawes, Holt county extension agent, was given a distinguished service award at the national meeting of county extension agents recently held in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Ed Bay, county agent from Illinois and chairman of the awards

This award is given to agents who have completed at least 10 years of service and have carried out an outstanding extension program in their counties. Not more than two percent of the agents may receive the award in any one year.


