The University of Nebraska is asking a 25 percent increase in the part of its budget which comes from the state general fund-supported by state property tax money. It wants an \$18,830,299 general fund budget, or \$3.8 million above the \$15 million it got for the

current two-year period.
From tuitition, fees, federal funds, and its share of the building fund levies, the University would have well over \$37 million to spend.

The University's new chancellor, Clifford Hardin, explained these reasons for the requested increase:

1. The necessity to pay higher salaries to topflight faculty members to keep the core of a high type University staff. 2. Plans for a "short course" in agriculture for boys who don't plan

to go to college. 3. Placing more emphasis on the freshman English program. 4. Money for developing the college of agriculture and the college

of medicine at Omaha.

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
