Let's Wipe Away Prejudices

And now it's time to start a new year! Let's all try to wipe the state clean of all the petty prejudices, grievances and intolerance and start again. If everybody keeps trying, we're all bound to improve a little bit. Grin.

When new year's is over, our palates are going to be so jaded with rich foods and overly sweet foods, that some plain old fashioned cooking will taste awfully good for a change. Somehow or other, canned tomatoes always taste so good this time of year. You can use them in so many ways, too.

For example, add one cup fresh or canned tomatoes to your favorite recipe for a 1 1/2-pound meat loaf that calls for about one cup of soft bread crumbs as a binder. For extra flavor and moistness in ground meat patties, add 3/4 cup fresh or canned tomatoes to one pound ground beef. Add 1/2 cup uncooked, quick cooking oats as the binder. Season. This combination has a different flavor and helps stretch the one pound of meat to serve six.

Four 1/2 cups fresh or canned tomatoes over a pot roast the last hour of cooking. It makes a delicious gravy, especially if a clove of garlic and a little thyme are cooked with the meat.

Tomatoes are a must for Spanish steak. Pour 2 1/2 cups of fresh or canned tomatoes over the browned meat and add chopped onion and green pepper. Season with salt and pepper. Cook until tender.

cup sugar, two tablespoons unflavored gelatin, one teaspoon vanilla, one pint whipping cream, one small round angel food cake, 1 1/2 cups crushed (drained) pineapple, 1/2 cup cold water, chopped nuts and cherries.

Scaud milk, beat egg yolks slightly and add sugar, add to scalded milk and cook over low heat, stirring constantly until a custard like consistency.

Add gelatin which has been softened in cold water. Stir until dissolved. Cool. When cool, add stiffly beaten egg whites and vanilla.

When mixture begins to set, add whipped cream. Grease baking dish and add small bits of angel cake, then pour over custard, the fruit. Continue until dish is full, then sprinkle with nuts and cherries (chopped) and set into refrigerator. Chill for 24 hours.

Twenty-three cents must be included in your check for each set of plates to be mailed out. Three cents for trailer plates.

COMMERCIAL TRUCKERS: Please be sure you have the correct empty weight of your truck, or truck tractor and semi trailer separate when applying for licenses. This is for your own protection.

Be sure your tax statement is figured in the correct precinct or town and school district number. If it is not correct please have it corrected at the assessor's office before coming to the treasurer's office.

The license fees are the same as for 1954.
