'Farming for God' Makes Profit Visiting Chorus, **Banquet Top Week**

The young adult Sunday-school class of the Page Methodist church began a "farming for God" project April 8, 1954.

Under the leadership of the teacher, Harley Kennedy, 44 acres of oats and sweet clover were seeded that day on the Glenn Harris farm northeast of Page.

During the noon hour, a service of dedication of seed, soil and sowers was conducted by the pastor, Rev. Lisle Mewmaw.

On May 21 the group both planted and listed the remaining 56 acres of rented ground, thus completing the first stage of their cooperation with God for an oats and corn crop.

Various members of the class cultivated the corn as it was needed. The problem of cutting cockle burrs in the cornfields and the stubble was met at various times with a lunch of homemade ice cream and cake.

More than 600 bushels of oats Plan Dial Phones in were threshed August 9 for their share. They were stored at the Harris farm. About 300 bushel were donated to the harvest festival and sold November 2.

Over 1,000 bushels of corn as their share was picked November 20 and stored at the Harris farm and sold to Rollie Miller. The grain was delivered March 17 and




