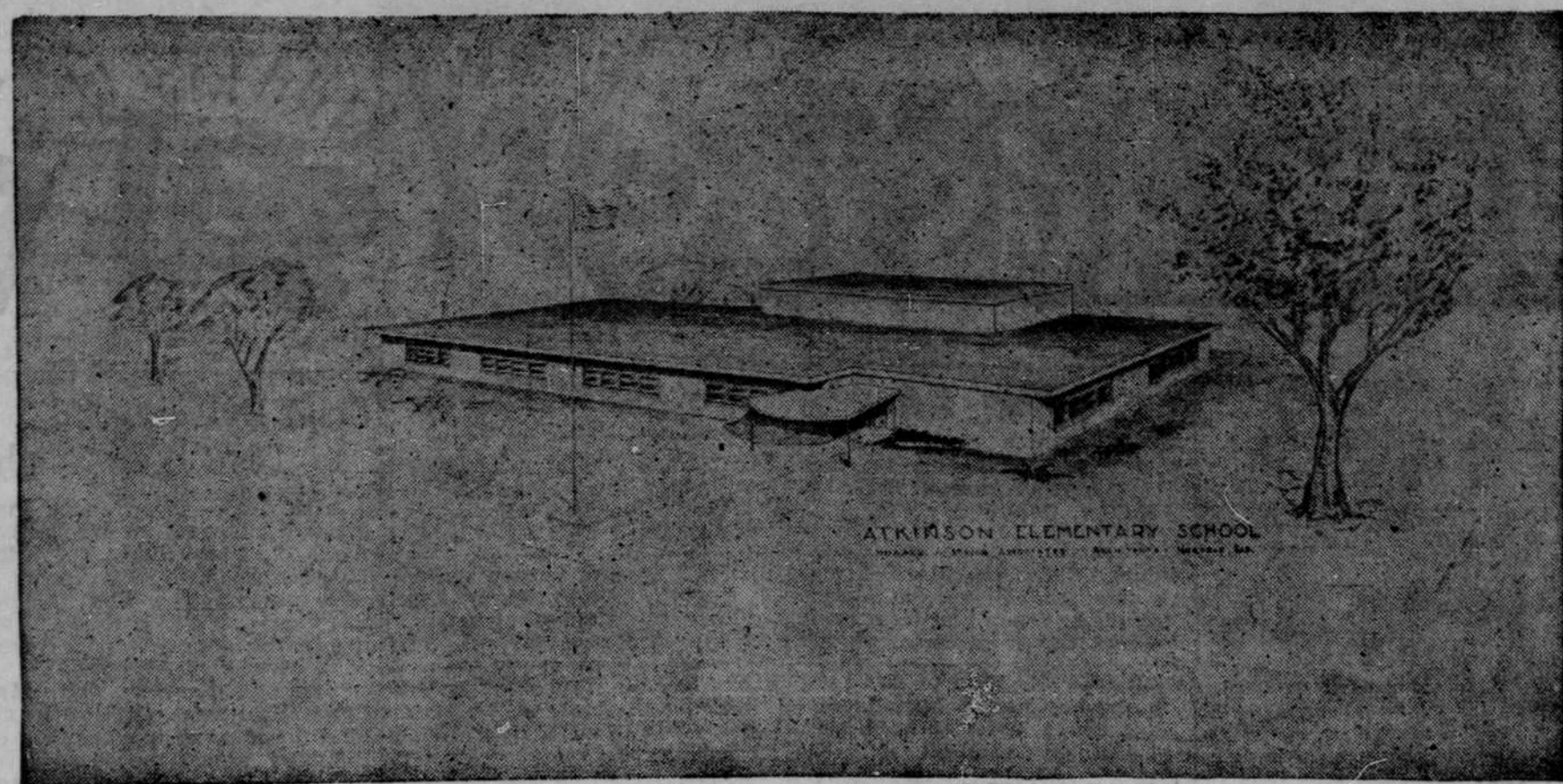

Atkinson voters will go to the polls on Tuesday, May 10, to vote "for" or "against" a proposed 155-thousand-dollar bond issue. The architect of the proposed building is H. J. Strong Associates of Norfolk. The building will include six class rooms, a kindergarten room, a multi-purpose room and an extra storage room which may

be converted to a kitchen at a later date. It will be a brick veneer building with a tile and plywood paneling interior. The floors will be asphalt tile. There will be built-in storage cabinets and shelving in the class rooms, semi-indirect lighting, devices necessary for audio and visual aids.

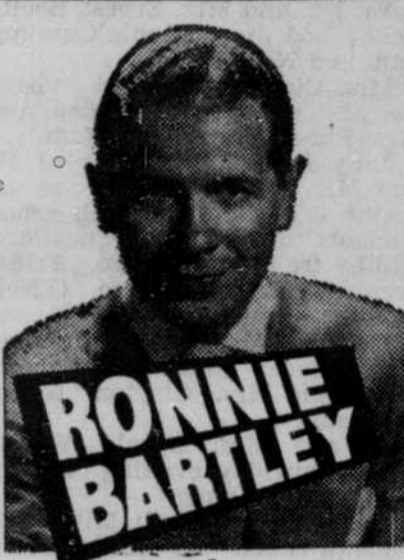
