Phone Lines Dull in Spring

Hi there, all you busy people! Even the country telephones are strangely quiet these days. Everyone has so much to do. Gardens are being encouraged and coaxed, the flower lovers have admired tulips for weeks now, and are now carefully watching the iris hoping it won't freeze and blast the high hopes of the iris lovers.

Some of the glad fanciers are still planting glads and will until the first of June, so that they'll have later glad blossoms coming on.

Most of the farm women like to cook with sour cream both because it is so handy and also because the results are absolutely delicious.

I'll pass along a recipe for Old Fashioned Sugar Cookies made with cream.

OLD FASHIONED SUGAR COOKIES

One and one-half cups sugar, 1/4 cups of butter, one teaspoon vanilla, two eggs 1/2 teaspoon soda, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg, two teaspoons baking powder, 3 1/2 cups flour, one cup sour cream and a dash of salt.

Cream together the sugar and butter. Add vanilla and beaten eggs, mix thoroughly. Sift the soda, baking powder, nutmeg and salt with the flour and add alternately with the cream. Roll out 1/4-inch thick on slightly floured board and cut with a two-inch

cookie cutter. Place on greased baking sheets and sprinkle with sugar. Bake in a moderately hot oven of 425 F. for 10 minutes.

CREAM DELIGHT SALAD
Here's a new salad made with sour cream that you'll all want to try.

One package of lemon gelatin, two cups boiling water, one teaspoon salt, one teaspoon sugar, two tablespoons lemon juice, one red apple (diced), one package (3-oz.) cream cheese, 1/2 cup walnut meats (broken), one cup sour cream.

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water and add salt and 1 tablespoon lemon juice. When slightly thickened, combine apples, sugar and remaining lemon juice with one half of the gelatin. Chill.

Whip the remaining gelatin with the cream cheese, with beater, until it is creamy. Add nuts, spread over firm lemon gelatin layer and chill one hour. Serve in small squares on greens topped with sour cream.

'REDBIRD READER' Recipe of the Week—DEVILED EGGS

Hard cook three eggs by placing eggs in cold water, heat water slowly to boiling point. Turn heat down and allow eggs to simmer about 25 minutes. Remove shell.

Half the eggs lengthwise. Remove yolks and mash or press through a sieve. Blend into yolks: 1 1/2 tablespoons mayonnaise, 1/2 teaspoon onion juice, 1/2 teaspoon vinegar or pickle juice, 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce.

Mix well. Refill egg whites with mixture. Sprinkle with paprika or minced parsley.
