1. That the rules and regula- Wilma Eppenbach as Executrix O'Neill shall be in full force and at 10 o'clock A.M. effect from the date of adoption of this Resolution.

2. That no parking be permitted at any time on the North side of Benton Street from a west corner of the intersection of Benton Street and Fourth Street in the City of O'Neill, and extending West from said point of beginning a distance of 450 feet.

3. That no parking be permit-ted at any time on the North side of Benton Street from a point commencing at the Northeast corner of the intersection of Benton Street and Fourth Street in the City of O'Neill, and extending East from said point of beginning a distance of 180 feet.

4. That Article 5 of the Resolution passed by this Council on of reclamation in Denver, Colo. May 3, 1955, be and the same hereby is repealed.

5. That hereafter no person shall operate a motor vehicle in excess of a speed of fifteen miles per hour on Benton Street from Second Street to Fifth Street in the City of O'Neill.




