O'NEILL CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

November 15, 1955 8:00 P.M., the City Council of the City of O'Neill met in special session pursuant to the Notice of Special Meeting, a copy of which is hereinafter set out. Present: Mayor Marcellus, City Clerk French, and the following councilmen: Crabb, Johnson, Heermann, Merriman and Stutz. Absent: Golden.

The meeting was called to order and the following proceedings were had and done: The following Resolution was introduced by Councilman Johnson, who moved its adoption.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'NEILL, NEBRASKA: That the Mayor and Council hereby find and determine that pursuant to a contract heretofore made, Francis R. Orshek, Inc., of Fremont, Nebraska, has performed the work and furnished materials for the construction of street improvements in Street Improvement and Paving District No. 16 of the City of O'Neill, and the engineer in charge has filed with the City Clerk a certificate showing the furnishing of said material and the performance of said contract as follows:

Estimate No. One - Amt. of Estimate, \$47,070.60; Now Due Contractor (80% of 1/2 of estimate), \$18,828.24; Estimate No. Two - \$49,944.20 (less previous estimates), Now Due Contractor (80% of 1/2 of estimate), \$1,169.44.

Warrants in the amount now due the contractor are hereby authorized and charged to said District. Said warrants shall draw interest at the rate of 3 3/4 percent per annum. The foregoing resolution having been read, Councilman Merriman seconded the motion for its passage and adoption. After discussion and consideration thereof, a roll call vote was taken on said motion, which resulted as follows: Aye - Stutz, Crabb, Heermann, Merriman and Johnson. Nay - None. Whereupon the Mayor declared said Resolution passed and adopted.

Motion by Stutz, seconded by Crabb that Walter Schmoor's salary be raised from \$200.00 to \$225.00 per month, starting November 1, 1955. Motion carried. Councilman Heermann introduced an Ordinance entitled: "AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO SEWERS AND THEIR UP-KEEP AND TO PROVIDE SERVICE CHARGES THEREFOR, COLLECTION THEREOF, AND FOR THE USE OF THE FUNDS RAISED THEREBY."

Said Ordinance was fully and distinctly read, and on motion duly made, seconded and adopted. It was designated as Ordinance No. 294A, in the title thereof was approved.

Councilman Johnson moved that the statutory rule requiring Ordinances to be fully and distinctly read on three different days be dispensed with, which motion was seconded by Councilman Stutz, and the Yeas and Nays being called on the passage of said motion, the following councilmen voted "Yes": Stutz, Johnson, Crabb, Heermann and Merriman. Nay: None. The motion having been concurred in by three-fourths of the Council, was declared passed and adopted. Said statutory rule suspended.

Thereupon said Ordinance 294A was read by its title a second time and then read at large and put upon final passage. The Mayor stated that the question is: "Shall Ordinance No. 294A be passed and adopted?" The Yeas and Nays were called and the following councilmen voted "Yes": Stutz, Johnson, Crabb, Heermann and Merriman. "Nay": None. The passage and adoption of said ordinance having been concurred in by a majority of all members elected to the Council was by the Mayor declared passed and adopted and the Mayor in the presence of the Council signed and approved said ordinance and the Clerk attested the passage and approval of same and affixed his signature thereto.

The following is a true, correct and complete copy of said ordinance: City of O'Neill, Nebraska ORDINANCE NO. 294A. AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO SEWERS AND THEIR UP-KEEP AND TO PROVIDE SERVICE CHARGES THEREFOR, COLLECTION THEREOF, AND FOR THE USE OF THE FUNDS RAISED THEREBY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'NEILL, NEBRASKA: Section 1. A sewer use charge of \$5.00 per month for each connection whether direct or indirect is hereby fixed to be charged and collected from the owner of each real estate property in the City of O'Neill having a connection either directly or indirectly, to the City sewer system, whenever said property is occupied or used.

Said charges shall only be used for the abatement or the reduction of ad valorem taxes being levied or to be levied for the payment of bonds outstanding, or to be used for the maintenance of existing facilities or the construction and maintenance of additions to such sewer system.

Section 3. All ordinances and parts of ordinances passed and approved prior to the passage and approval of this ordinance and in conflict therewith are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be in full force and take effect from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law. Passed and approved this 15th day of November, 1955. A. MARCELLUS Mayor

RESOLUTION WHEREAS: The provisions of Ordinance No. 226-A of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska, the City Council and Mayor are authorized and empowered from time to time to promulgate and adopt regulations governing the use of the streets in said City for the control of vehicular traffic thereon, including parking, and the City Council, deeming it necessary and proper that the following rules and regulations shall be adopted, and that the same shall have the force and effect of said Ordinance No. 226-A:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'NEILL, NEBRASKA: 1. That the rules and regulations herein adopted for the control of traffic within said City of O'Neill shall be in full force and effect from the date of adoption of this Resolution.

2. That parking be permitted at any time on the North side of Benton Street from a point commencing at the Northwest corner of the intersection of Benton Street and Fourth Street in the City of O'Neill, and extending West a distance of 450 feet.

3. That no parking be permitted at any time on the North side of Benton Street from a point commencing at the Northeast corner of the intersection of Benton Street and Fourth Street in the City of O'Neill, and extending East a distance of 180 feet.

4. That Article 5 of the Resolution passed by this Council on May 3, 1955, be and the same hereby is repealed.

5. That hereafter no person shall operate a motor vehicle in excess of a speed of fifteen miles per hour on Benton Street from Second Street to Fifth Street in the City of O'Neill.

Cattlemen Reaffirm Support Opposition

A large gathering of Nebraska stockmen made up of executive council and advisory board members of the Nebraska Stock Growers association met at Alliance Wednesday, December 28, and registered unanimous dissent to any movement that would incur the use of price supports on cattle.

"We discussed the parity program being suggested for cattlemen, but feel it is still to our best interests that a free enterprise system be maintained," declared Bern R. Coulter of Bridgeport, president of the association.

The group reiterated its position that the cattle business can operate best without government interference, declaring that supports would bring regulations and controls that go with any form of government assistance.

"We recognize the fact that cattle prices have been discouraging in recent months, but we do not feel that price supports are the answer," Mr. Coulter concluded.
