

Amelia's ninth and 10th grades have a total of only five pupils. This is the third consecutive year in which the high school enrollment has been fewer than 10. State law specifies that a two-

It has fewer than 10 pupils three consecutive years. It is within 15 miles of another high school "on a reasonably improved highway.'


