PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at the regular city election to be held on the 3rd day of April, 1956, in the City of O'Neill, Nebraska, there shall be submitted to the legal voters of the City the following proposition:

"Shall the City of O'Neill erect a building on real estate now owned by said City to be used as a fire station for the City, and
