A freakish and unseasonal snow storm, directly related to torna-does touched off in Oklahoma, to Omaha Woman Kansas, Nebraska and Iowa, whipped into the O'Neill region early Tuesday.

Rain began falling Monday evening, turned to sleet and later to snow. By 8 a.m., Tuesday four inches of snow had fallen here. The snow was borne by northern winds with gusts up to 40 mph.

Visibility was zero and highway and street traffic ground to a halt. State highway department snowplows were kept off the highways until breaks in the storm became evident.
