The semi-annual meeting of the O'Neill Deanery of Catholic Women will be held today (Thursday) at 2 p.m., at Atkinson.

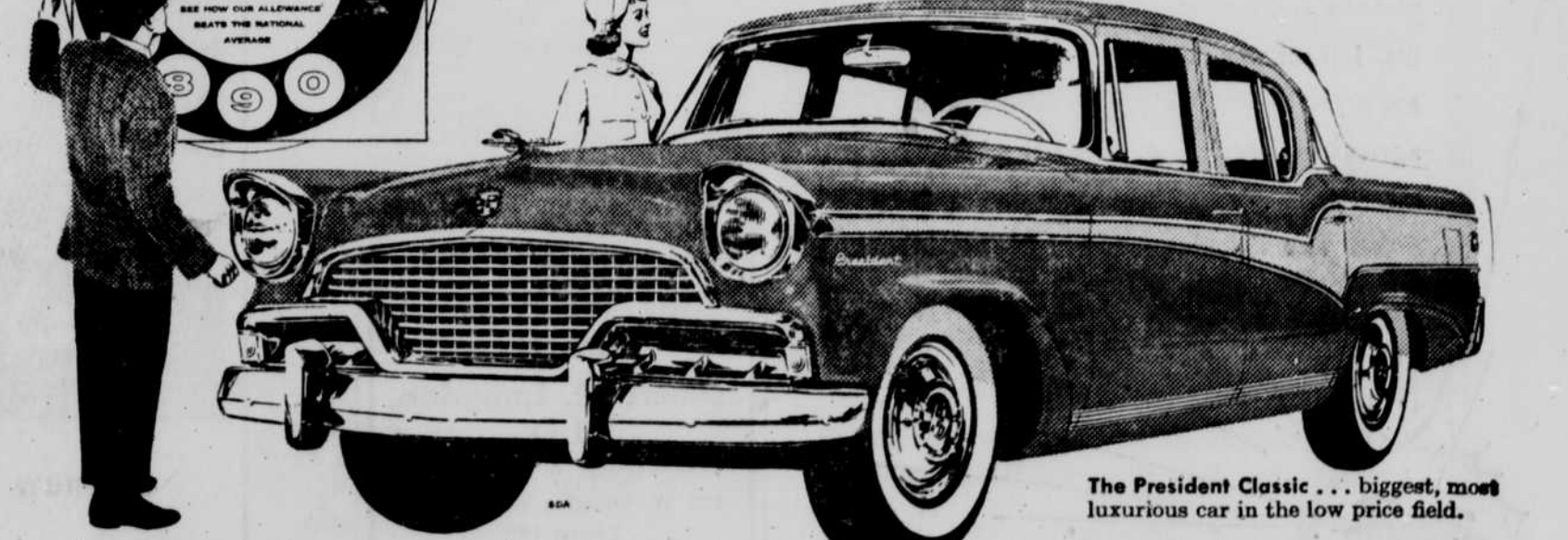
