A well located office 20x20 is furnished with plenty of up-to-date equipment including a \$700 Frigidaire ice cube machine. There is a screened partition for a bed plus a full bath that joins the office. A large, well-lighted utility room has a full line of commercial equipment consisting of a Glover washer, Huebsch dryer, Bock extractor, Simplex mangle, etc.

All units are large, well-lighted and designed for cross-ventilation. Being attractively decorated with beautiful drapes, venetian blinds and a full line of the famous Simmons steel furniture, they create a pleasant restful atmosphere.

The units are all air conditioned with Victor and GE air conditioners, new in 1955. There is wall-panel heating with Stewart-Warner and Holly heaters. Nine are equipped with tubs, and 12 have showers. The floors are all covered with a good quality asphalt tile of attractive patterns.
