Accelerated Roads -

State Engineer L. N. Ress has pin-pointed the magnitude of the accelerated federal aid program for roads. If Nebraska used all the money

available from the federal gov-ernment for the interstate high-way, and all regular federal aid funds allocated in 1956, it would have to award \$927,000 worth of contracts per week starting last contracts per week, starting last July 1, to use it all in the next

That calculation does not in-clude the regular federal aid funds which are not yet under contract, but allocated to Ne-braska, Ress said. Ress stated if the counties don't country their present use of

quadruple their present use of federal funds and the cities don't step up their pace three - fold, Nebraska will have \$13.2 million to match at the end of the next

Of that figure, about \$3 million will be federal aid for the interstate highway which Nebraska, under its present revenue structure can't match Ress said. Right now, Nebraska is one of

11 states that are lagging in the interstate highway construction program. Nebraska hasn't used any of the money the federal go-vernment has made available on a \$9 federal, \$1 state matching basis.

Ress said the highway administrators throughout the nation are trying to keep current in federal aid expenditures for the in-terstate highway. This, he said, is because if they don't congress could conceivably cut back the NOW ON SALE!
