This should not be surprising since the secretion of the thyroid gland, a butterfly-shaped organ in the neck, influences every function and cell of the body. When the gland does not secrete enough hormone, any number of things

can go wrong.
Although the thyroid hormone was the first ever recognized as necessary to a healthy life, and thyroid extract has been used as medicine since 1895, it has been only recently that its many possible applications have been widely recognized.

Scientists have discovered many things about the hormone in the last few years; for example, that once it has been secreted by the gland, it changes form. At least nine different chemical compounds ound in the body have been identified as fractions of the hormone.



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
