Cattle receipts, 1,885 head. The first cattle sale of the new year got off to a running start. Attendance was large. Interest keen and bidding spirited with prices on all classes being swept upward from 75c to \$1.50 a hundred. Quality generally was good to excellent. Steer calves topped at \$22.50 with all good to choice kinds selling from \$19.00 to \$22.00 medium to good fully \$19.00 to \$19.75. Heifer calves fully \$12.25 higher at \$18.50 to \$17.85 cwt., with choice yearling heifers at \$15.50 to \$16.90 cwt. Yearling steers, wts. 600 to 725 of choice quality at \$18.25 to \$20.00 cwt. The cow market was on fire, comers \$7.50 to \$8.25. Cutters at \$8.50 to \$9.50 and beef cows on up to \$12.00 Bologna Bulls at \$12.75 to \$14.00 cwt.

At this time it looks as if Verdigre had one of the best markets in the nation in comparison to reports given by the USDA for Monday's market. Extreme top on choice butchers was \$17.75. However, the bulk of the No. 1 hogs sold from \$17.40 to \$17.80. The No. 2 and 3 hogs weighing from 200 to 240 sold from \$16.85 to \$17.35. Even the heavier weight hogs sold on an active tone. Hogs weighing 280 to 300 pounds, but strictly meat type sold from \$18.50 to \$18.80.

Pigs weighing 75 pounds sold for \$16.90 each. Light butchers on feeder account sold from \$17.50 to \$18.40. One buyer purchased 94 head in that range. Bred gilts were in good demand but the boars were selling \$10 to \$15 cheaper.

Baby calves sold from \$6 to \$18 per head. Other cattle sold about in line with the market.

Next Monday, we are planning a special cattle sale. We already have 7 or 8 listings of good cattle, so if you are planning to buy or sell cattle, remember the sale next week. Hog sale starts promptly at 11 a.m., so plan your consignments accordingly.
