

Combine gelatin, Sucaryl, salt, water, and chocolate in top of double boiler. Cook over hot water until gelatin dissolves and chocolate is melted. Remove from heat; add egg yolks one at a time, beating well after each addition. Return to top of double boiler and cook for 2 minutes. (Mixture will become very thick and cling in a ball in center of pan.) Remove from heat; add vanilla. Chill in refrigerator for 15 minutes. Meanwhile, combine egg whites, ice water and dry milk solids; beat on high speed of mixer until of consistency of whipped cream. Carefully fold into the cooled chocolate mixture. Line a loaf pan (7 x 3 x 2-inches) with waxed paper. Place lady fingers around edges of pan. Carefully pour in chocolate mixture and chill until firm

Makes 6 servings. Each serving contains 129 CALORIES; 7.4 grams protein; 8.9 grams fat; 7 grams carbohydrate. If made with sugar, each serving would contain 193 CALORIES.

I am secretary of district 69. consisting of mostly rural property plus the village of Gross where the school is located.


Thirty-six Boyd districts already have joined the Nebraska Small Schools association and have paid over \$700 to finance that group's fight against enforced redistricting.


