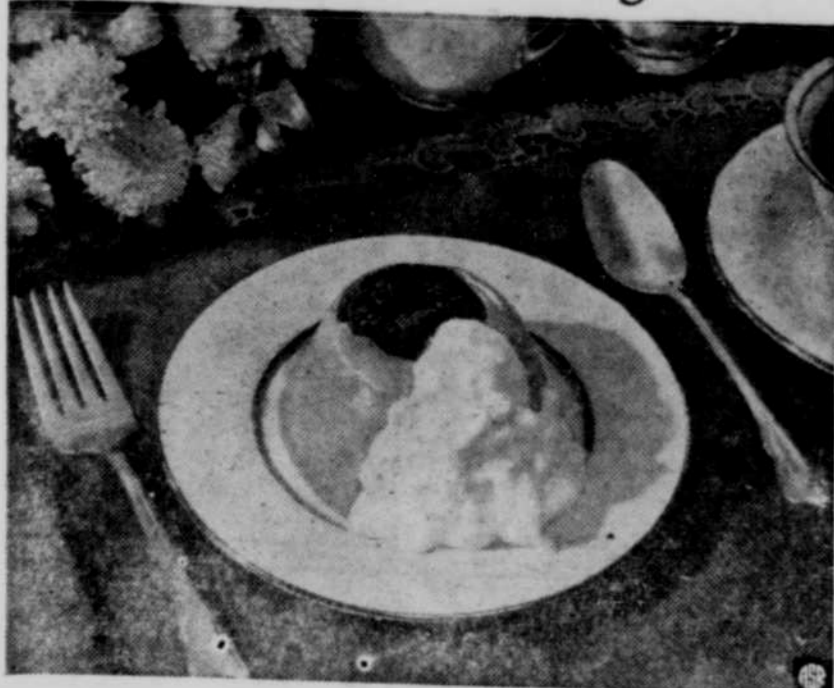


Choc-Scotch Pudding

Whole cream-filled chocolate cookies are alternated, sandwich-style, with layers of quickly prepared butterscotch pudding to make this two-flavor treat. It's really just as simple as making a sandwich—and the result is double-delicious! Here's how:

Choc-Scotch Pudding

1 package butterscotch pudding mix
18 Sunshine Hydrox Cookies

Prepare butterscotch pudding as package directs. Place one of the cream-filled chocolate cookies in the bottom of each of six 6-ounce custard cups. Pour hot pudding over each cookie to cover. Repeat, alternating cookies and pudding until each cup contains three cookies and three layers of pudding. Chill overnight.

Top with whipped cream and serve with hot cream, maple syrup or whipped cream, as desired. Makes six servings.

Death Strikes Man Learning to Walk

LONG PINE—Robert Coen, 22, of Long Pine, halfway achieved a seven-year ambition to learn to walk again.

Sunday he died in an Omaha hospital before his ambition could be completely fulfilled.

In December, 1949, Robert then 15, was on a hunting expedition when he was accidentally shot by a companion. Fragments of a .22 caliber bullet pierced his spine, causing paralysis from the waist down.

For seven years he was in and out of the University hospital

in Omaha, always with the thought that he would be able to walk again.

By the end of 1950, he had learned to get about with elbow length crutches. But the paralysis which made these crutches necessary also caused a kidney malfunction.

The day after last Christmas Robert was readmitted to University hospital. Pneumonia resulting from the kidney ailment caused his death.

Services for Robert were held at Long Pine.

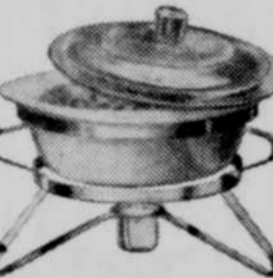
The 1957 heart fund drive at O'Neill will be directed February 1-28 by Mrs. John Lee Baker under the sponsorship of the American Legion auxiliary.

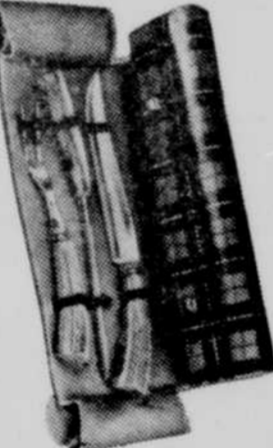
