

LINCOLN - The Nebraska supreme court Friday reversed a Lancaster district court ruling which had upheld the state board of education in refusing to approve Amelia high school district 228, Holt county.

The board had refused to approve the two-year Amelia high school on the grounds that for three consecutive years the school had had less than 15 pupils and lay within 15 miles over a reasonably improved highway" of another high school (Chambers), as provid-

ed by statute. The effect of the board's ruling was that the Amelia twograde high school was to be denied free tuition privileges. Had the ruling been sustained this would, in effect, have sounded the death knell for the high school (the first eight grades would not be affected).
