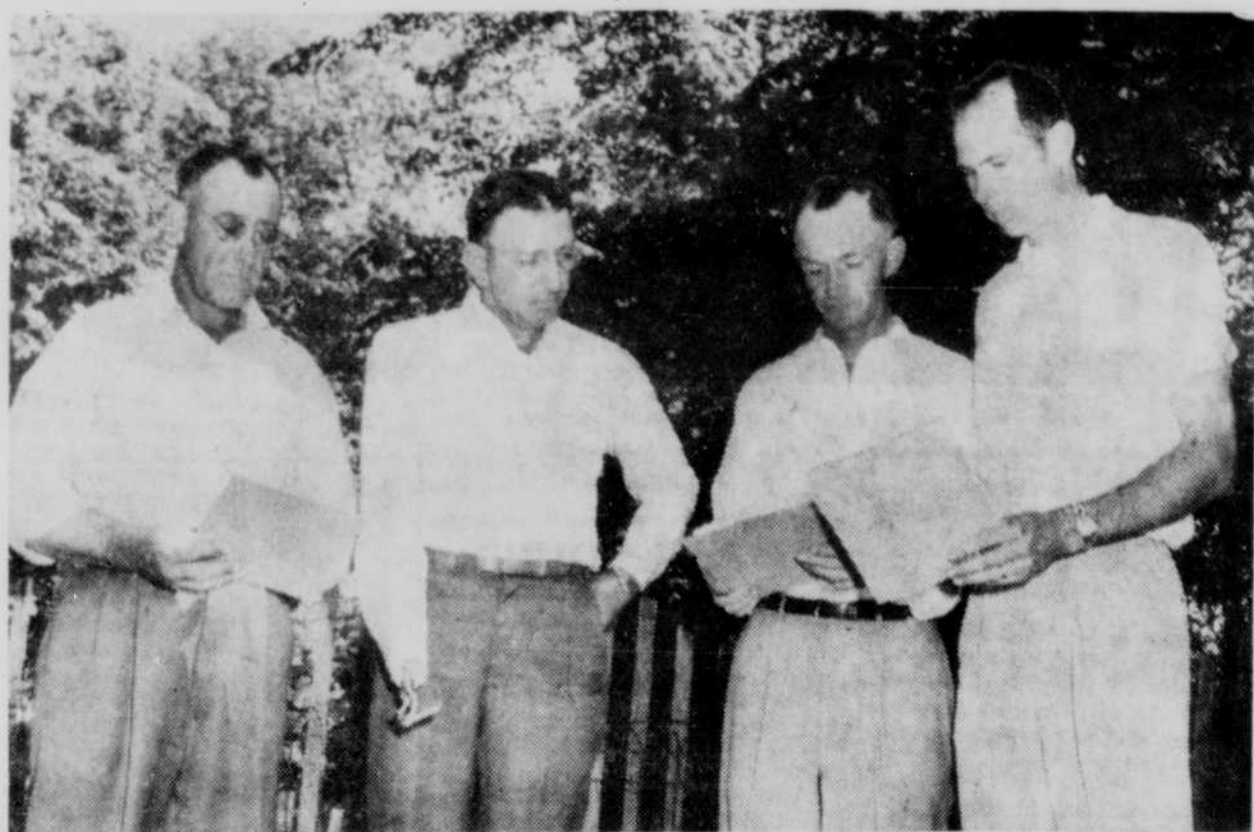

Spencer Dam Has Birthday

SPENCER—The Fourth of July marked another anniversary for the Spencer hydro-electric power plant.

It was on that date in 1927 that the switch was thrown and the single 1,300 - kilowatt energizing unit went into action for the first time. A second unit of the same size was added in November of that year.

Although the maximum output put was comparatively small, it served as supplementary power for the Interstate Power Co., which furnished electricity for the states of Iowa, South Dakota and Nebraska. Power was discontinued into Iowa and South Dakota in 1948.

The Finley Construction Co., of Missouri Valley, Ia., began work on the dirt dike in June, 1926. It was necessary to haul a greater part of the dirt in for this project. Horses were used for this work and it being a drought year, feed was a problem, making it necessary to provide feed from quite some distance at premium prices.

The dike was completed the following year on this eastern dam. Eight years later a part of it washed out. This was repaired in a short time. In the fall of 1936 the spillway gave way. Four years elapsed before the power unit was back in operation.

The original dam was of the gravity type, relying on weight alone to hold it in place. The present concrete portion of the dam is of cantilever type construction in which piers are driven into bed rock in order to support the structure itself.

In addition to construction the present dam differs from the old in that it has pin gates in addition to the tairster gates for emergency release.

At present the plant is owned and operated by the Consumers Public Power, having purchased it from the Interstate in 1943.

Working on hourly shifts, a total of six men are employed at

the plant at present.

Robert P. Hamilton, one of the operators, has been on duty for 31 years, having started as bunk house cook.

The Spencer hydro is the largest power plant on the Niobrara, and that river, which derives its name from an Indian tribe of the same name, is the swiftest flowing plains (non-mountainous) stream in the world.

Travelers on U. S. highway 281, a transcontinental route, are impressed with the glimpse of the

installation. The new highway 281 bridge little more than a stone's throw from the big dam. At night the water rushing through the spillway, the churning river, the placid lake behind the dam and the many lights present an impressive sight.
