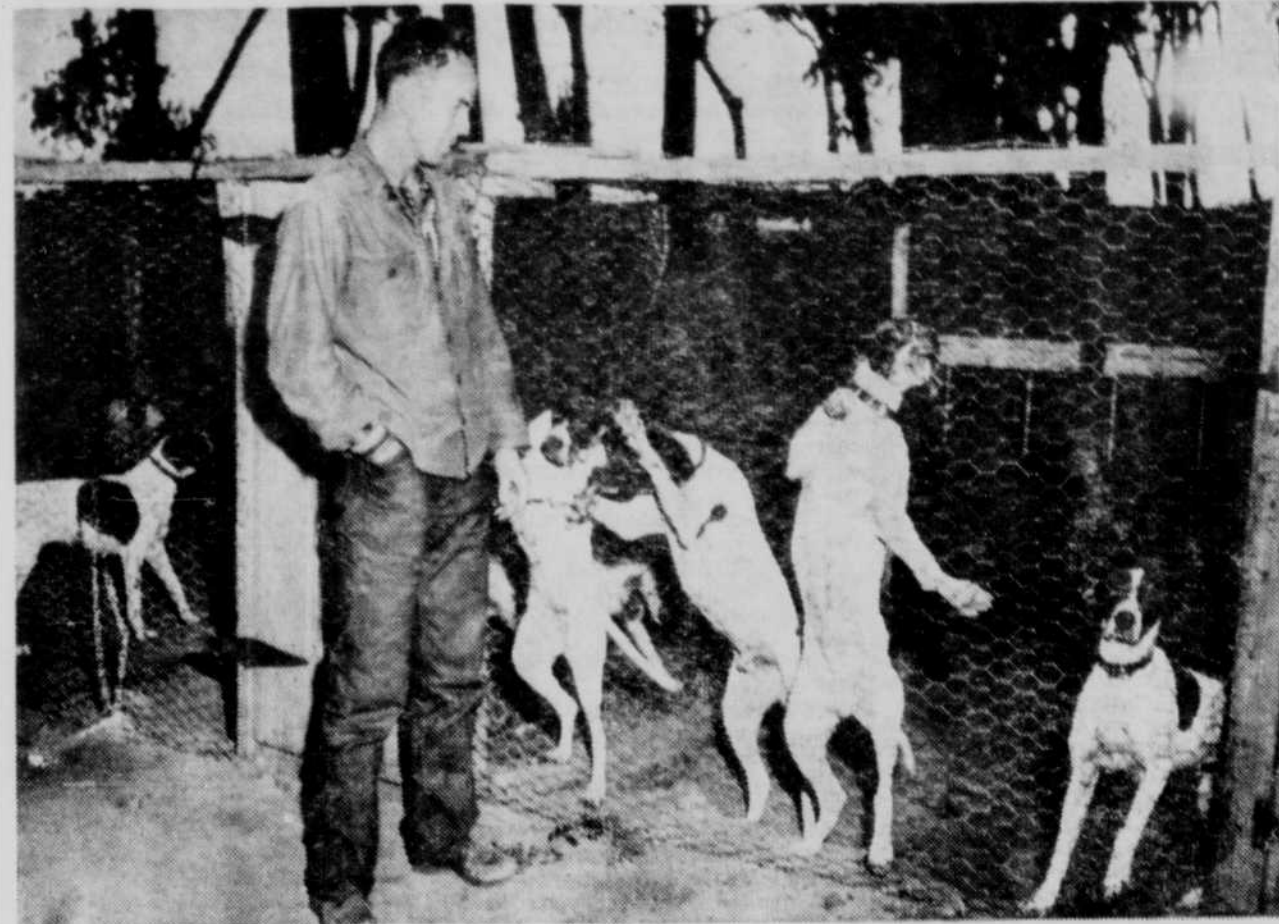
Seavenger Hunt at Searles Home
