### Cullen Bound to District Court



# Jess Hupp Fatally Stricken

## Dustin Farmer Dies Suddenly While At Lunch Table

ATKINSON — Jess Hupp, 60, virtually a lifelong resident of Boyd and Holt counties, was stricken fatally with a heart at-tack during the noon hour Wednesday, November 20, at his home. He fell to the floor while seated at the lunch table and died mmediately. His wife was near-
