### Held Files Motion for New Trial

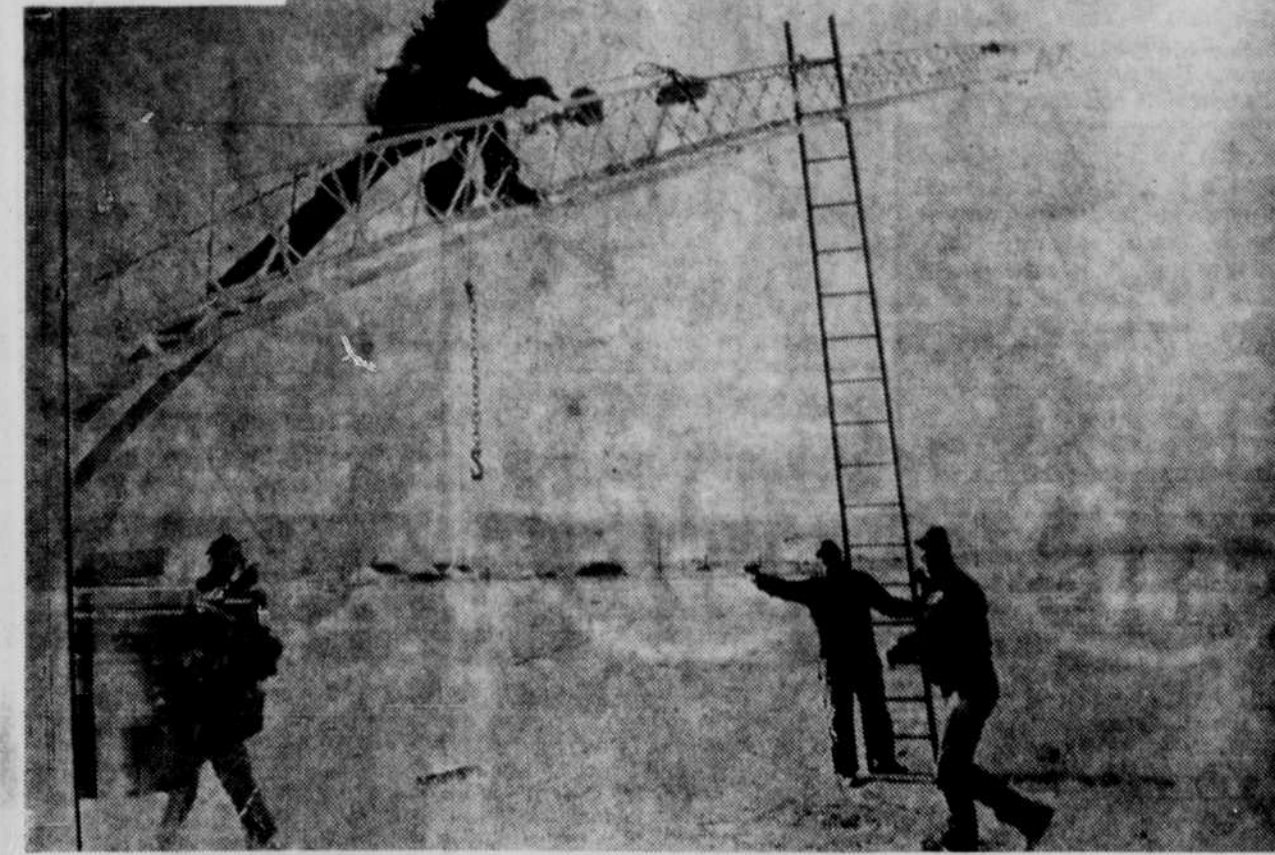

### Channel 13 Might Go Into Operation Friday Evening

Despite a mishap Wednesday afternoon in which one of four television antennae towers crashed to the ground while being erected, half of O'Neill's new community television apparatus is expected to be in operation by Friday night.

Kenneth Werner of Chambers, project engineer, said he is hopeful of having KTIV's signal amplified and being rebroadcast locally on channel 13. KTIV (Sioux City) is the channel 4 station.

The other half of the twin-pick-up-booster relay apparatus was damaged in Wednesday's accident. When repairs are completed, it will pick up KOLN-TV (Lincoln), channel 10, and rebroadcast the programs locally on channel 2.

Two towers were erected Tuesday without a hitch. But when the third was being elevated the next day by Cecil Thornton's crew, the 95-foot tower broke loose from the boom and fell, striking Mr. Werner on the forehead. Several stitches were needed to close the wound. Werner returned to the scene after treatment and Wednesday night was directing work at a blacksmith shop where portions of the damaged tower are being mended.

Werner said if new segments are needed they will be added in a few days, but he is confident half of the system (KTIV's portion) will be in operation in a matter of hours.

Needed replacement are portions of fine KOLN receiving and booster antennae.

**Delay at Sea**

During the Atlantic crossing with a shipload of immigrants, the vessel lost its propeller and floundered at sea for two weeks before help came. Passengers stowed in the steerage had brought along their own food and rations ran short. The voyage required more than a month.

She went to Hanover, Kans., with a group of other Russian-born immigrants. In 1901 at Hanover she married Dominick Bohn. They moved to Knox county where they leased school land for a time and adopted a daughter, Marie. A few years later they moved to Ewing where Mr. Bohn died in May, 1934.

Nick Bohn of O'Neill made his home with the Bohns at Ewing after he was in his teens. He was a nephew of Dominick Bohn. On October 28, 1945 at Lynch she married Joseph Schollmeyer, a widower who for many years had been a Holt county supervisor. The couple made their home in O'Neill.

**Hurt in Accident**

Mrs. Schollmeyer and her husband figured in an auto accident at Danceland corner in 1949 and Mrs. Schollmeyer was seriously hurt.

Mr. Schollmeyer died June 26, 1954.

The late Mrs. Schollmeyer was a member of St. Patrick's Catholic church here.

### Minister Dies At 'Y' Pool

Kirschman, 34, May Have Broken His Neck at Milwaukee

Funeral services for Rev. Edom Kirschman, 34, former pastor of the Assembly of God church at O'Neill, will be conducted at 2:30 p.m., (MST) Friday, January 10, at Scottshuff at the Assembly of God church there.

The body will lie in state at the Benson funeral home in Scottshuff until the funeral hour.

Services were also conducted at Milwaukee at 2 p.m., Wednesday, January 8.

Reverend Kirschman died Monday, January 6, in the Central YMCA swimming pool at Milwaukee, Wis. He had moved from O'Neill to Milwaukee in July. He had joined the YMCA Monday, He and Rev. Harvey L. Flaherty, 40, pastor of the Milwaukee Gospel Tabernacle, went swimming. Rev. Kirschman went into the pool. His body was found floating on the water. A rescue squad administered first aid and artificial respiration for 45 minutes but to no avail. It is theorized his neck might have been broken in his jump or dive.

Joseph Lamonte of Milwaukee, deputy county medical examiner, said the young minister's body was seen floating in the water shortly after he jumped in to the deep end of the pool.

Reverend Kirschman was a swimmer and a diver. He was a native of Elgin, N.D.

He was pastor of the Bethel tabernacle in Milwaukee at the time of his death. Prior to coming to O'Neill in the summer of 1955, he served churches in Wood Lake and Aurora.

He was ordained in 1951 in the Nebraska district of the Assembly of God.

Survivors include: Widow—Betty; son—Gary, 13; daughters—Lynette, 8, and Vonita, 7; parents—Mr. and Mrs. Louis Kirschman of Scottshuff.

Several carloads of parishoners from the O'Neill Assembly of God church will be going to Scottshuff for the funeral.

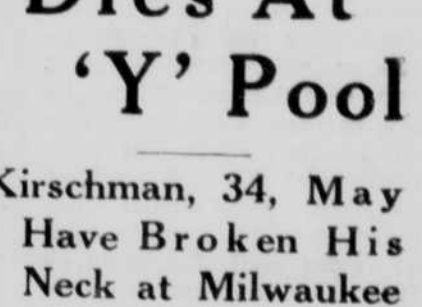
