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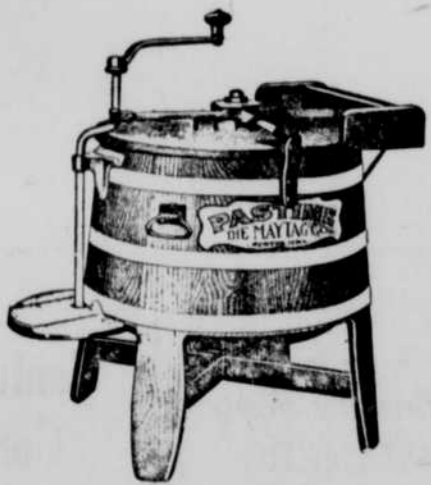

1909 . . . the First Maytag



The first Maytag washer, manufactured in 1907, was operated by a hand crank. According to the advertising of the day, it could be operated by any five-year-old boy, using less energy than in a game of marbles. The tub was made of cypress.

1911 . . .

Electricity was coing. . . but not for many years in the rural areas. But the swinging ringer was a departure for the Monday morning chore girls.

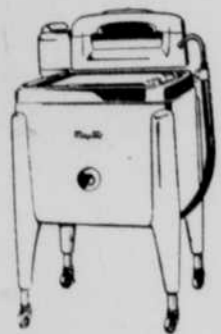


1917 . . .

The mill race principle—patterned after the old mill race wheel . . . cylinder type washer with a cast aluminum cylinder in a metal cabinet. Safety features became immediately popular.

1919 . . .

Then came the trim, new washer with a square tub and a novel cast-aluminum dolly turning back and forth under a flat aluminum lid. Demand for home laundry equipment caused MAYTAG to drop production of farm implements and accessories.



1941 . . .

The 4,000,000th washer was made by MAYTAG and the Newton, Ia., firm was far and away from the leader in the home laundry field.
