### Maxwell Addresses

Long-term credit is an important tool in the farming and ranching business, Thomas A. Maxwell, president of the Federal Land bank of Omaha, told members of the Elkhorn Valley National Farm Loan association at their annual stockholder's meeting Wednesday, March 5. Two hundred twenty-one guests of the association attended the meeting held in the Royal theatre in O'Neill.

Farmers and ranchers use their land as security to borrow for additional land purchases, make repairs and improvements, construct new dwellings, refinance existing indebtedness, purchase livestock and other agricultural purposes, continued Mr. Maxwell, and he urged farmers and ranchers to keep good inventories of their costs of production and receipts of commodity sales, as a check against their progress. He added successful operators will have need for accurate inventories in the present methods of high cost operation. Loan volume of the association now stands at \$4,927,500, Lyle P. Dierks, secretary-treasurer, said in his report with membership totaling 587.

Frank C. Kruntorad of Ewing was reelected to the board of directors for a three-year term. Mr. Kruntorad, association president, was chairman of the meeting. Dinner was served the registered members and guests.
