The Holt County Board of Equalization will meet May 19, 20 and 21, 1958, at the Supervisors office in the Court House at O'Neill, Nebraska, and will be in session, not less than three days or more than forty days.

All complaints before the Board of Equalization are required to be made in writing, specifying separate grounds of objections. Complainants will be afforded hearing before the Board and will be required to present evidence in support of their complaints.
