

## Award Winners at O'Neill High Told Commencement To Be Held Tonight

Additional awards and scholarships to be given to O'Neill high school seniors at commencement tonight (Thursday) are:

Regents scholarship, University of Nebraska—Michael Liddy; alternate—Gale Holcomb and Melvin Luben; both of the alternates were awarded a regents scholarship not used by winners; value is \$100 for the 1958-'59 school year only.

Knights of Ak-Sar-Ben award—Gale Holcomb, value \$150; Phi Delta Theta—Michael Liddy, value \$300; Nebraska association of Church colleges—Jane Petersen, value \$250.

Before a scholarship can be issued, in many cases, the student must sign an agreement that he or she will attend the college that issues the scholarship. Principal Willard Solfermoser said.

Because of this agreement, the scholarships available to the state normal schools and other individual colleges are not being used.

Usual requirement is that the student be in the upper 25 percent of the class.
