### Cole Circus Coming to Town Sunday

The famous Cole wild animal circus will be coming to town Sunday, June 29.

Circus day is always a big event for every youngster and for all those adults who are still young at heart.

The big white trucks and vans of the Geo. W. Cole three-ring circus will roll into town early Sunday morning and will move directly to the Carney park showgrounds where the work of setting up the tents and other circus props will get under way.

For all those able to get to the showgrounds, the setting up of the circus should prove an interesting operation. The Cole circus carries its huge "big top" on large, truck-mounted spools, its spread on ground mechanically, and then raised into the air with the help of ponderous elephants wearing special leather work harness. Stakes are driven mechanically and the big top goes into the air with amazing speed and efficiency.

About 10 a.m. on circus day, all of the circus's wild animal cages will be open for nearly an hour's free inspection by visitors to the circus grounds. The Cole circus has found that this morning "free sample" has had an excellent effect on box office receipts by giving townspeople a change to judge the quality and calibre of the show.
