

'Penny' Postcard Now Three-Cents

Postal rates will take a whoop tomorrow-Friday, August 1. According to Postmaster Ira Moss, the rate hike will affect everyone who mails a letter

First class letters, currently mailed at three cents an ounce, will raise to four cents. Airmail rates increase one cent an ounce to seven cents while airmail postal cards become five

Third class, including unsealed greeting cards which now go for two cents increase to three cents for the first two ounces and 11/2 cents for each addition-

In addition to these rate increases, the postal department put a "penalty charge" on post age due mail as of July 1.
