State Fair Queen Will Be Selected

KOLN-TV, channel 10, Lincoln, is conducting a statewide search for a queen of the Nebraska state fair. Any person who has been selected as a queen of any recognized activity in 1957 is eligible.

To qualify "recognized activity", the following examples are given: Queen of sports events, queens of high school proms, county fair queens, or princesses.

The only queens not eligible are those who have already won honors outside their home county, for example, "Miss Nebraska," or "Dairy Princess."

The minimum age requirement is 16 years. There is no requirement with respect to marital status. Each person entering will pay all of their own expenses to attend from Lincoln, or while in Lincoln for the first phase of the judging. The elected queen will preside over selected activities at the 1958 state fair during fair week, and will, in addition, receive an all-expenses paid trip to Hot Springs, Ark., for herself and one companion. While reigning as queen during fair week, all hotel and other expenses will be provided. This contest will be featured in "live" telecasting from channel 10.

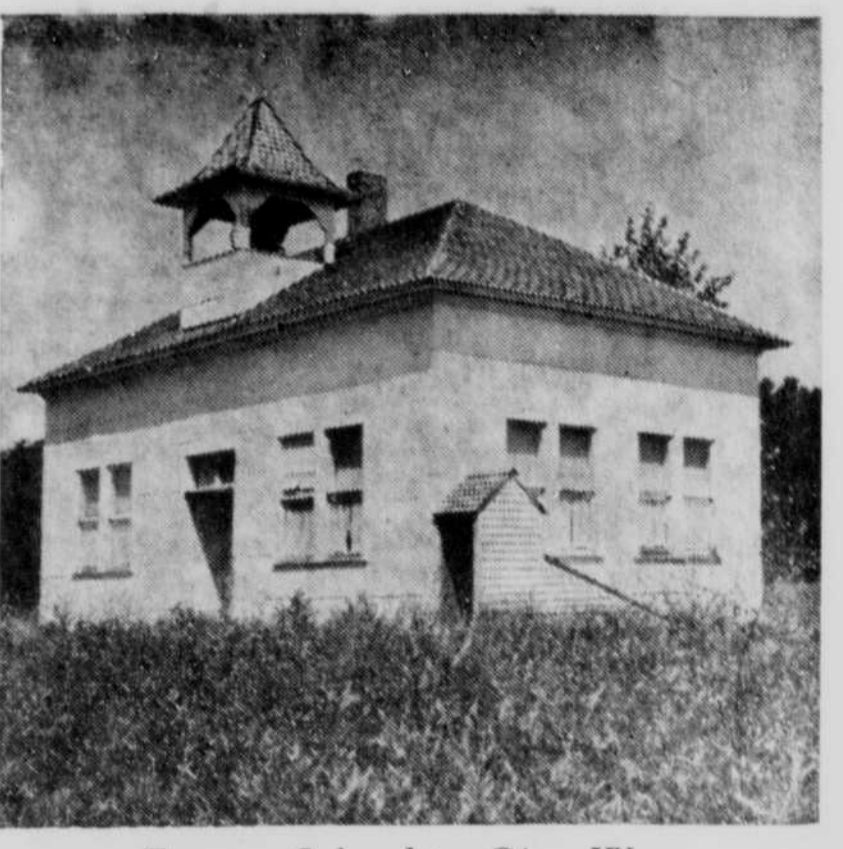
