

Social Security Payments \$45,400 Monthly

A representative of the Norfolk social security office will be in the assembly room basement of the Holt county courthouse in O'Neill from 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. today (Thursday). Self-employed applicants should bring extra copies of their 1936 and 1937 tax returns, receipts showing that the self-employment tax is paid, and proof of age.

The representative will be visiting the Boyd county courthouse at Butte from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Friday, August 15.

Monthly old-age, survivors and disability benefits are being paid to 944 beneficiaries in Holt county at the rate of \$45,400 per month, according to Clifford Kitzelson, manager of the Norfolk office.

Payments to insured beneficiaries nationally average \$65 a month. Additional payments go to their dependents such as wives, widows, children under 18, disabled children, and parents. Disabled persons between 50 and 65 receive an average of \$72 monthly.

Miss Peklo died of a heart attack Wednesday evening, August 6, at her home in Lynch. She had been ill about a month but was believed to be on the road to recovery.
