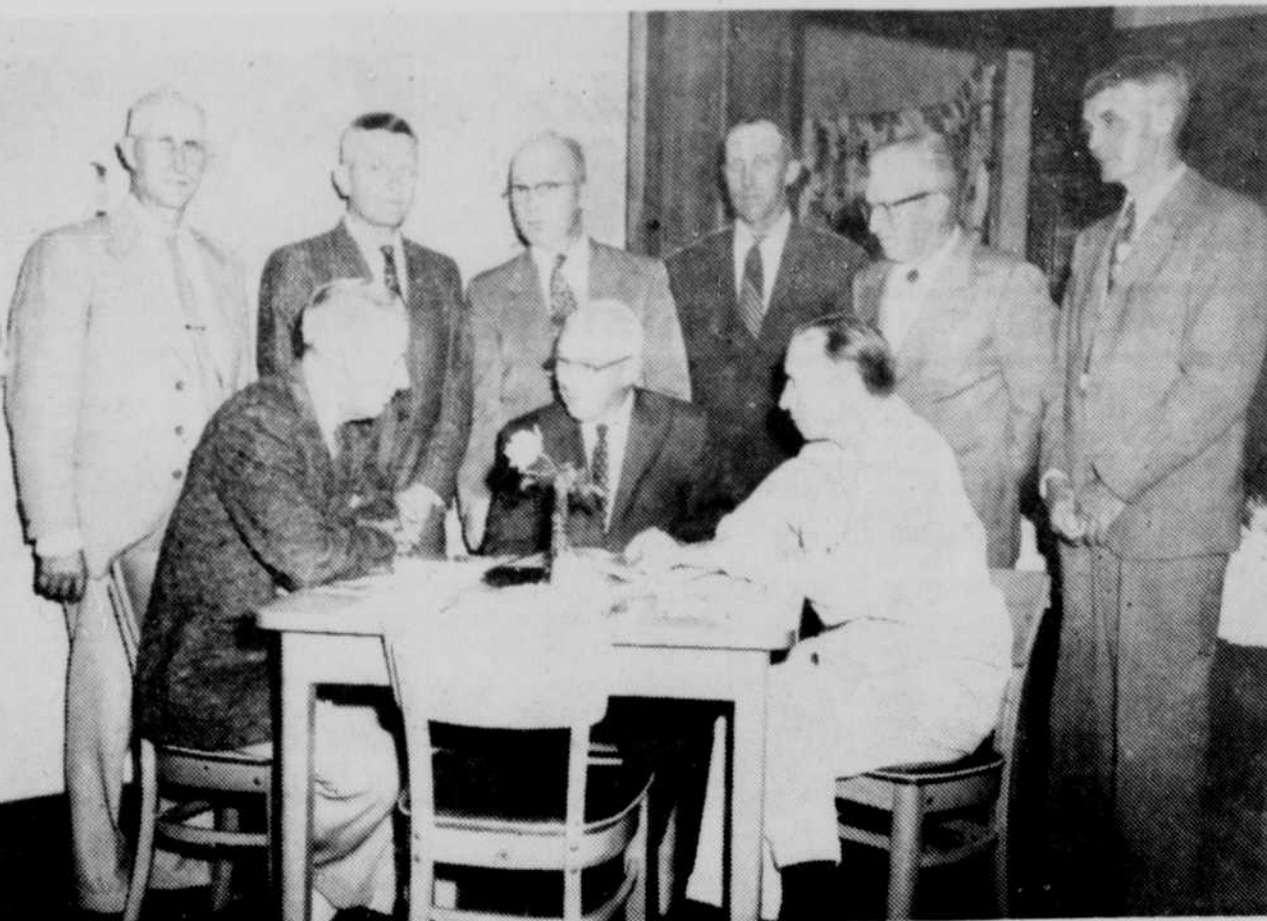

State Soil, Water Committee Here

Dinner Meeting Caps Tour of Area

Members of the state soil and water conservation committee made a tour of Holt county last Thursday and dined here in the evening.

The state committee had spent the early part of the week touring northcentral Nebraska districts. Districts represented at the Town House dinner included Holt, Keya, Paha-Brown-Rock, Knox, Antelope, Garfield and Loup.

The state committee was created a few years ago by an act of the Nebraska legislature as the official agency of the state in connection with soil and water conservation, flood protection and watershed protection.

The committee consists of 11 members including five conservation district supervisors, who are elected by supervisors in attendance at their annual conference; Dean W. V. Lambert of the college of agriculture, E. C. Reed, director of conservation and survey at the university; Ed Janik, director of the extension service; Dan S. Jones, head of the department of water resources, and two members appointed by the governor—one to represent irrigation interests and the other civic groups.

North-Nebraska Gets Air Service

Local air service came to Nebraska when Frontier Airlines inaugurated the first flight under the new seven states local service case.

Under the case, major Nebraska cities, for the first time, will be linked together with commuter type service.

Frontier Airline's Denver headquarters advised the eastbound flight, leaving Ainsworth at 1:05 p.m. (CST) would pass over O'Neil at 1:35 or 1:40 p.m., using O'Neil's omnirange station at Municipal airport as a "fix" point.

The craft's location will be reported immediately by shortwave to air control at Kansas City, Mo., and by teletype at Norfolk to Frontier's Denver office.

Westbound, the planes will pass over O'Neil between 6:40 and 6:45 p.m., on the Norfolk-to-Ainsworth leg.

Rates to be charged by the airline have been authorized by the State Railway Commission which has jurisdiction of public carriers.

Non-charter passenger fares between the following cities, one way and round trip, include: Ainsworth and Chadron, \$12.95, \$24.70; Ainsworth and Lincoln, \$17, \$32.50; Ainsworth and Norfolk, \$11.15, \$21.20; Ainsworth and Omaha, \$17.15, \$32.60; Chadron and Norfolk, \$22.05, \$41.90; Chadron and Omaha, \$28.05, \$53.30; Lincoln and Norfolk, \$6.00, \$11.40; Lincoln and Omaha, \$5.65, \$10.80; Norfolk and Omaha, \$6.00, \$11.40.

Freight rates between the following cities for 100 pound shipments, include: Ainsworth and Chadron, \$4.50; Ainsworth and Lincoln, \$3.40; Ainsworth and Norfolk, \$2.60; Ainsworth and Omaha, \$3.90;

Chadron and Lincoln, \$5.00; Chadron and Norfolk, \$3.90; Chadron and Omaha, \$5.60; Lincoln, \$2.40; Lincoln and Omaha, \$2.40; Norfolk and Omaha, \$2.60.

All airport improvements, of course, are footed by the taxpayer, who will also provide communications and weather information for the airline.

Valentine had originally been left off the northern Frontier route, but the civil aeronautics board Friday gave its okay. Service to Valentine will not begin immediately.

Valentine recently voted 18-thousand-dollars in bonds for airport improvement. This will be matched by the state and the federal government will put into the combined amounts put up by city and state. The overall improvements will cost in the neighborhood of 70- to 75-thousand-dollars.
