Two public meetings of the Nebraska-South Dakota boundary commission have been scheduled. Members of the commission were appointed by the governors of the two states.

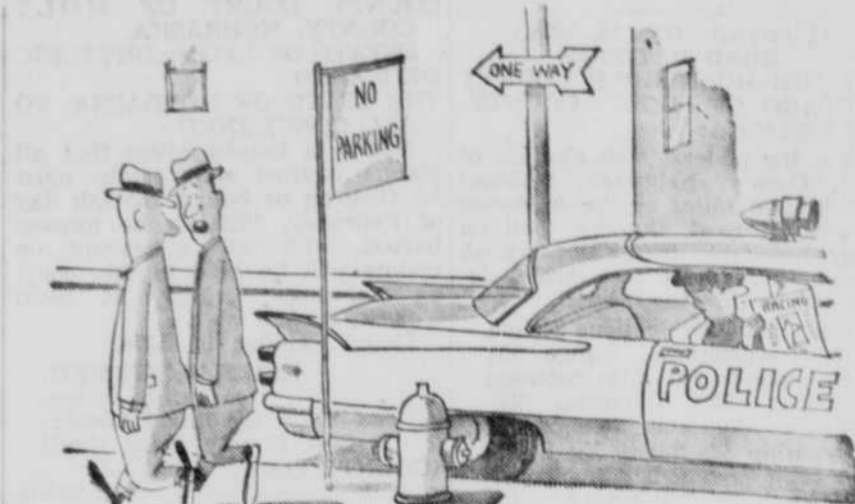
