Orletha Anna Reiss, Radean G. Block United at Wilcox

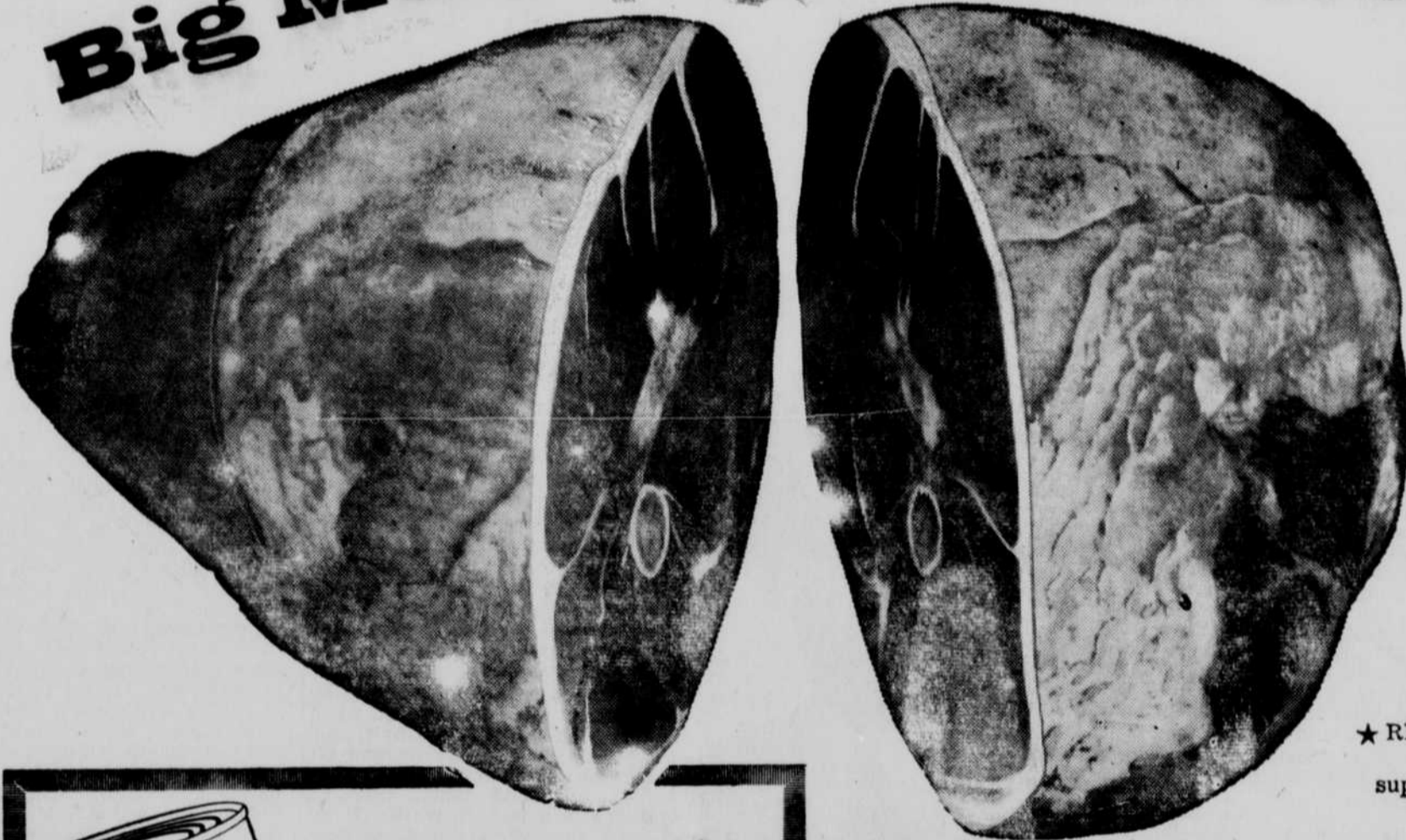

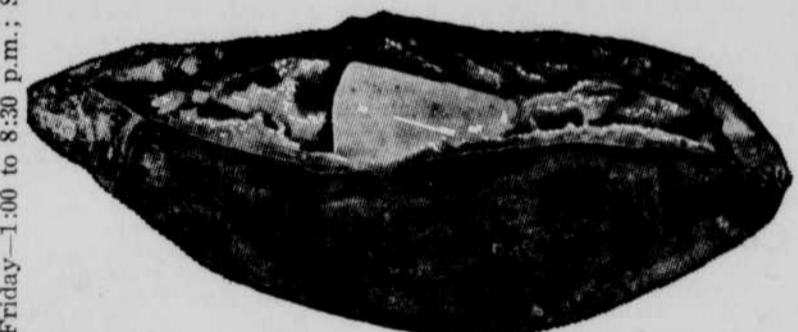
